

NATIONAL TRIBAL ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE FORUM



Members of the environmental department; Vickie Kujawa (OES Director), Victor Roubidoux (Aviary Manager), Whitney Warrior (Water Quality Program Manager), and Megan Trope (Aviary Assistant); attended the National Tribal Environmental Science Forum in Traverse City, Michigan on June 7-11. This year's conference was themed "Mother Earth: Indigenous Knowledge and Science to Promote Positive Change." Tribes from across the country gathered to discuss this theme. Topics included continuous tracks of classes that covered air, water, land, and people. At the conference, a booth was set up for four days displaying all of the Office of Environmental Services programs including agriculture, the aviary, waste management, water quality, and air quality. The booth was set-up to educate other tribes about how to start and run individual environmental programs as well as to show all the programs currently being run at the Iowa Tribe. Videos and brochures were made available to the public for further information on each program. Members of OES attended the classes to learn new procedures and regulations. In addition, Vickie Kujawa made a presentation about permitting aquatic pesticides.

EAGLE RESCUED BY IOWA TRIBE



The Grey Snow Eagle Sanctuary responded to an eagle in distress call today. Victor Roubidoux, Aviary Manager, led the aviary staff accompanied by Council Person, Renee Prince, and Environmental Director, Vickie Kujawa across the Arkansas River near Ponca City to rescue a wounded bald eagle. The immature eagle was staying in a dead tree on the river bank near a campground where it was found by Betsy Stewart. Mrs. Stewart con-

tacted several agencies seeking help for the bird before she located the Grey Snow Eagle House. Victor examined the eagle and found that the tips of both wings were missing flight feathers leaving the eagle incapable of flight. Mrs. Stewart observed a pair of mature bald eagles, probably parents of the injured bird, bringing food to the eagle. The eagle will be taken to a veterinarian tomorrow for a complete examination.

Water Pollution Control Program

Hello, to all Tribal members and non-members. The Water Pollution Control Program has finished out its third quarter (May-July) for the grant year. Every quarter I will be updating you, as a whole on the status of the program. May, June and July's sampling tests revealed a high quantity of bacteria. This limit is contributed by the change in weather, rise in temperature and movement of streams. The heavy rains have caused more creek bed erosion and high volumes of turbidity for all creeks sampled by OES. A few creeks have taken bigger hits than others but they all seem to be recovering from the destruction. The new bridge in Fallis has finally been completed. Although the construction degraded the water quality and depths have changed considerably, Bear creek seems to be recovering beautifully. Due to the high volume of bacteria in the creeks, it would be wise to refrain from body contact or recreational activities until further notice. Fish samples were taken from Sand Creek to fulfill grant requirements and these samples will let us know where our streams stand on support of life and quantity of life. OES will preserve the specimen and take them to Shoup Laboratories located at the Oklahoma State University campus for identification and counting. The 4th quarter sampling will begin August 4, 2010. Creeks assessments will be conducted in the 4th quarter to complete a segment of the Water Pollution Control Grant. WPC has a full schedule planned for the 4th quarter and will update the community on the results at the end of that quarter.

OES will also be contributing labor efforts the restoring the Conservation Area and Nature Center. We will accept any volunteer work for the labor that it take to perfect these areas. Once restored, these areas can provide better grounds for education, community involvement and development. We plan to use the areas for Tribal Youth Education, Migratory Bird watching and observations, and recreational opportunities for all the Tribal community (i.e. Fishing, trail hiking, bike riding, picnics, and buffalo and eagle watching). We plan to put our best effort into developing this for the Tribal community and again would love the support and volunteer work from any one. It's your land help us keep it GRAND!

We are still continuing work on a Non-Point Source grant to help with the degradation of our streams. Trainings plus time and effort are essential to getting a grant of this type, but overall this would open up possible jobs for tribal members in the environmental field. We are excited about learning more and doing the proper actions in applying for the NPS grant. Once we have completed all the requirements the Water Pollution Control program will be a stronger asset to the Tribe as well as its members and staff. If there is anyone interested in volunteering a day sampling or learning more about the program feel free to call and be included in what we love doing on a daily basis.

Water Pollution Control Program

The WPC Program conducted the annual Tribal Youth Out Reach section of the grant 106 on July 22, 2010 at the Eagle's nest and Conservation area. The children were taking to the Conservation Area to learn about wildlife and plants within a Wetland. Each student was given a book and asked to draw animals that they encountered at Conservation Area. They were also asked to describe the objects they were drawing as those things fascinated them. After the trip to the Conservation Area we returned to TYP for a more education lesson. Each child was given a canvas and paints or chalk so that they could use their imagination on what they could remember from seeing the Wetland or what they feel a Wetland should look like. Each child along with staff painted pictures that they were allowed to keep for themselves. All of the art work turned out more wonderful the more the student got into the project. The main idea was to incorporate a sense of preservation, observation and excitement about the environment. If we can instill these into our Tribal youth they will indefinitely be more inclined to want to change the world and keep our lands and water beautiful for the next generations.



Representatives from the Cimarron Casino and Iowa Tribal Government will be onsite to discuss available positions, benefits, and training opportunities. The Cimarron Casino is located 10 miles south of Stillwater, near the junction of highway 177 and 33.

The Iowa Tribe has a contract with the Department of Rehabilitation Services (DRS) for getting individuals to work. The Iowa Tribe will provide on-the-job training to participants with a disability for up to a 90 day period through this program offered by the DRS through stimulus funds. Native Americans with disabilities are encouraged to coordinate employment through the Iowa Tribe of Oklahoma's Vocational Rehabilitation program. To apply for the OJT program through the DRS use the application provided on Iowanation.org in the "Job Postings" section.

ELIGIBILITY: Services are offered with the goal of self-sufficiency. All programs administered by Employment & Training target the economically disadvantaged, unemployed, or under-employed Native American Indian. An application process is

required. Receipt of any assistance is dependent on an unemployment need basis, meeting specific program requirements, and availability of funding. Not all services are of a financial nature. **CITIZEN POTAWATOMI NATION** has integrated employment,

training, and related services through Public Law 102-477 to serve the Indian population in central Oklahoma. Under P. L. 102-477, Employment & Training combines funding from Department of Labor (DOL), Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), and Health & Human Services (HHS). Although no additional Federal dol-

lars are associated with this law, it does allow and encourage combining of resources that has resulted in lowered administrative costs and more dollars reaching participants and more served.
